This enables us to prioritise higher-risk suppliers for engagement and follow-up. High-risk suppliers are re-assessed quarterly. We conduct an annual survey of Group timber suppliers to understand the origin of the timber used in Taylor Wimpey homes, to confirm compliance with our policy on timber certification and to identify higher-risk areas of the supply chain. These Group suppliers are required to provide us with evidence of timber certification status as part of this process. We require any companies sourcing from higher-risk countries to carry out due diligence to ensure timber meets our standards. If any non-compliances are identified, we work with the supplier to ensure remedial action is taken.
